"Lift weights, lift your spirits," Debbie smiled. "I had a trainer elite with over 30 years experience, a former Marine and a Zen martial artist, create the fitness concepts and exercises for the book, Frank Mikulka of the Hollywood Atrium Club in nearby Lawrence."

The threesome discussed the national stress heralded by 9/11 and the November 12 disaster, which invaded the idyllic shores of the Belle Harbor community. Debbie, whose mother's home, is on Beach 134 Street, emphasized that, "we need to learn to be in the moment, to appreciate what we have and what we have adapted to. Perception is everything. We must affirm life."

Mary asked Debbie what inspired her to write this book. "I woke up with the idea two years ago before dawn one March morning. I knew it was my mission as a child of holocaust survivors. I have seen the darkness and appreciate the light. I am determined not to survive, but to thrive. In fact, many of the phrases in the book just came into my head like a dream."

Since Debbie does de-stressing workshops and presentations on various subjects such as boosting the immune system, insomnia, anger management, how to go from a worrier to a warrior, and turn back the clock in the New York City area, Mary and Sister Peggy decided to take the lead and bring Debbie's workshops and book back to her roots – the Belle Harbor community. "We have to get this groundbreaking work to the peo-

ple, they have to know about it," said Sister Peggy.

Debbie elaborated on how the book is designed to help people get through life's challenges and remove the division between mind and body. "It should be one word. With the holidays coming up, Turn On Your Inner Light' becomes a fitting title for Chanukah, Festival of Lights and Christmas. With so many loved ones missing this year, finding one's balance and happiness takes greater effort."
